We are all aware that high-speed Broadband is essential in this modern world, and the rural areas have yet to get the speed required. There is an offer from County Broadband, a private company, to install fibre cable to every household in the Parish. If this is to go ahead, then more people are still needed to sign up. It is your decision, but at this stage we believe this is our only opportunity to get this coverage. There may be other options, so you should check these out as well.

Ongoing Issues for the Community Hall and Parish Council

The Community Hall is losing three key Committee Members this year, the Treasurer, and the two Members who manage the maintenance of the building. We will struggle to plan for the future at the Hall without new members who can take on these roles. If you can spare some time, and we do know how busy people are especially with families and work, but getting involved and supporting your community is very rewarding.

There are currently no vacancies on the Parish Council, thankfully we have welcomed two new members recently, but more help is always needed, so if you can spare a little time to find out what the Parish Council does, why not come along and find out more at the next meeting and see how you can get involved.



We also mentioned in the last edition that we would like to run a village fete for Tibenham, but we have only two people who are interested in organising an event and could do with a couple more to spread the load.

Many of you will be aware that the Parish Council brought together volunteers to help build the Boardwalk on a public footpath, and continue to keep other public footpaths open. This was a very positive experience for all who took part, and what we achieved in a number of hours of work was truly amazing.

The Parish Council has applied for a grant from South Norfolk Council for litter-picking equipment and so we will be able to organise more litter picks at times to suit ourselves.



Watch out for reminders of litter picks on "Next Door", a website which is very useful for local events, which both the Parish Council and Community Hall use to send out reminders.

The big issue for many is lack of other facilities in the village. We do have "The Greyhound" a great place to meet, and Rob provides a number of food evenings and Sunday lunch. The Church still provides regular services, but needs new people to take on the role of Church Wardens.

Unfortunately, there is no bus service in Tibenham but the Parish Council has been working on trying to resurrect the community car service that previously existed - this would provide you with someone to call should you need to attend the Hospital or Doctor, but volunteers are required to do this. There is payment for mileage available paid for by South Norfolk Council and the Parish Council.

What to do if someone has heart failure

If you think someone might be suffering from heart failure, this is what you do:

- Stay with the patient
- Call 999
- Follow the Emergency Operator's instructions

If there is someone who can stay with the patient, the Emergency Operator may decide you need to fetch a defibrillator. He or she will tell you which is the nearest one, the code to open the cabinet, and exactly what to do.

Regular Events

The "Light Exercise" class is held every Tuesday at 10.00am and costs only $\pounds 2.50 - it$ is led by a professional trainer.

There is also the "**Drop-in Café**" every other Thursday at 10.30am, which gives everyone a chance to pop in and discuss issues they may have, over refreshments. There is also a library of information on Health and Wellbeing in the foyer at the hall if you need any help. This started as an addition to the Wellbeing strategy to improve access to daytime activities, and is being well supported.

On the fourth Monday of the month, during the winter, there is a "**Games Afternoon**" between 2pm-4pm where you can join in card and board games for a relaxing afternoon, over refreshments for only £2.00, starting in October.

Short-Mat Bowls is held every Wednesday afternoon from 2pm-4pm for $\pounds 2$, and there are **Community Badminton** sessions on Tuesday and Thursday at 5.30pm -7.30pm, $\pounds 2.50$ per session. Come along and get fit, all abilities are welcome.

The hall runs two sessions of what we call Community Badminton, Tuesday and Thursday evening between 5.30pm and 7.30pm. These sessions are open to anyone who wishes to play, although we do not differentiate, the Tuesday session is mainly female, and Thursday mainly male, although this is not always the case. We have room for more players to attend.

We also run a **Luncheon Club** on the second Monday of each month, for older people to get together. Booking is essential for this event through **Joan Woodcock** on **01953 860271**.

The kitchen is regularly inspected by South Norfolk Environmental Health to ensure standards are maintained. For many years we have been classed as 5 Stars, this has continued this year with a new award of 5 Stars.

Our Big Project for 2019/20 – Replacing the existing Playground



I make no apology for repeating this message in this magazine to everyone, as the Hall Committee believes that providing a new playground is so important to the village, especially as we have to remove the existing worn-out equipment.

The equipment is maintained by the Hall Management Committee and has always been inspected annually by the Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents (ROSPA), who report on the condition. Their report from 2019 says that the wooden equipment is showing deterioration to a point where it requires replacement within the very near future, not surprising since the date plate on the swings is 1998. A decision has been made to remove the existing equipment this year as there is concern about this deterioration, and we are hoping to get some new equipment sometime next year.

We still will need a lot of support / help throughout this project and, as well as applying for grants, we will have to raise funds and try to get sponsors on board. What have Tibenham, Bury St Edmunds, Michelangelo's David and a secondary school in Tuscany got in common?



A few weeks ago I was teaching English to a group of Italian teenagers in Bury St Edmunds. Towards the end of their stay I asked them about where they came from, and it emerged that they were very proud of their home town. They told me that overlooking their town of Carrara in Tuscany, just up the coast from Rome, was a series of white marble caves, and it was from these caves that the piece of marble used by local artist Michelangelo to create his most famous sculpture "David" had been taken.

This all rang a bell with me, and later that evening I checked the official listing for Tibenham's War Memorial, and sure enough, the people of Tibenham had decided to dig deep, and had raised enough money by public subscription to get the very best material available - Carrara marble. (Historic England claim it is "Carrera", but Carrera is a design house best known for sunglasses and certain Porsche sportscars.) Carrara marble is not only beautiful to look at, pure white with distinctive pastel coloured veins, but it is also much more resistant to weathering than Portland stone, which many contemporary memorials were made from.

I wrote up a brief history of our War Memorial and printed off a photo of it which I had taken soon after its October 2018 clean-up, and next day I presented it to the Italian students' teachers. They were delighted, and soon after they had arrived home in Italy, I heard that the photo and writeup were to be framed and displayed prominently in their school's main hall. A little piece of Tibenham in the heart of Tuscany.

More on the subject of the War Memorial in the next newsletter. The masons who cleaned it up last year are due to return this month for a follow-up clean, and they will then look again at the lettering, some of which was damaged in the severe weather we had early in 2018. It is likely that we will not be able to have a full re-lettering job done as this would be prohibitively expensive unless we can get grant funding, and in the present economic climate we might need to defer this for a while.

Meanwhile, the Parish Council will be laying a wreath as usual at the War Memorial on Remembrance Sunday - details to follow, as everyone is welcome to attend.

What's happening about the new houses in Tibenham?

Most of you will be aware that Saffron Housing Trust had proposed building ten houses in Tibenham. Discussions about this have been going on for some time, and the Parish Council have met Saffron representatives several times, and have had the chance also to listen to input from residents.

The Parish Council are in favour of new housing in Tibenham, particularly if it is likely to bring families into our community. We welcome new people who want to become part of the community, and we certainly do not want the village to die through lack of new blood. However, new people mean additional strain on our resources and facilities, such as they are. It would be difficult to bring new families into the village if we cannot offer them safe footways so they don't have to walk their children on increasingly dangerous roads, access to reliable public transport, safe places for children to play, adequate parking provision, and so on.

Unfortunately, Saffron Housing have said they are not prepared to help Tibenham to improve our infrastructure to cope with the extra people and their cars. As a result, the Parish Council have suggested that they would be better off looking at the other communities in the area who also took part in the 2017 Housing Survey - nearby villages that already have public transport links, footways, suitable play areas and even shops. So, it looks as if those proposals are now dead in the water as far as Tibenham is concerned.

First of a series about People of Tibenham

WILLIAM WALES HORNE 1773 – 1826 The life of this lesser known hymn writer.

William was a son of William and Mary Horne of Gissing. William jnr. Was born in 1773 and Christened on 6th August 1773 at Gissing. In 1793 he became minister of a small Baptist Church at Tibenham. William moved to Yarmouth in 1797, then onto Leicester. In around 1806 he moved to London, where he preached at the City Chapel, in Grub Street, before preaching for many years at Trinity Hall, Aldersgate Street, and Hephzibah Chapel, Limehouse, taking services every Sunday at both places. William remained here for many years. The two congregations later united at Ebenezer Chapel, Commercial Road.

Whilst minister at Tibenham, in 1794, William compiled a small volume of hymns entitled *New Songs of Sion; or Short Hymns collected from the Scriptures of the Old Testament.*

The book was published by Ann White, (preface dated 25th January 1795), for William who sold copies from Tibenham. The book was also being sold by W. Booth, in Norwich and J. Mathews in London. This publication, was taken up by several Chapels and has been reprinted as recently as 2010 in the United States.

In 1802, during his time at Leicester, he published another collection. *A Selection of Hymns for Public Worship.* William had sought hymns from the best authors of the time and included many original works. Out of the 310 hymns, 9 had been written by William.

In 1806, when minister in Grub Street, he published *Sion's Harmony; or the United Praises of Ransomed Sinners; a complete Selection of Hymns for Public Worship*. There were 513 hymns of which 22 were written by William. In 1812 an *Appendix* appeared, and in 1823 a new edition of the entire book was published. This edition was titled *Sion's Harmony of Praise; a Selection of Psalms, Hymns, and Spiritual Songs, for Public, Social, & Private Worship, from the best Hymn Writers; with a variety of original pieces, by W. W. Horne,* London, printed by W. Woodcock, in 1823. This edition contained 752 hymns, 95 written by William.

William died in 1826 aged 53, while still pastor of Ebenezer Chapel, Commercial Road, London. Now other works of William Wales Horne are being digitized and printed a paperback including 2 sermons he gave in Great Yarmouth on 27th October 1799.
