Volunteering

District and County Councils nowadays play less of a part in the day-to-day running of parishes and towns. This has a lot to do with the steady withdrawal of funding from central government. Councils have had to look at their budgets and decide which services are to be considered essential, and which are to be seen as non-essential. With the cost of services soaring, and with increased demands on adult social care caused by an ageing population, for example, councils have had to add more and more to the "non-essential" category. Unfortunately, the effects of this are felt particularly in smaller rural communities like ours, where there is no infrastructure in place to fall back on. The result is that a lot of things which were once done by District and County Councils now are not done - unless we do them ourselves.

If we want verges cut, litter picked, road signs and street nameplates cleaned, footpaths cleared, boardwalks built and maintained, the recycling centre looked after, newsletters distributed, the churchyard kept clear, and the Community Hall managed and events there planned and run, we can no longer look to Norwich to help us out.

Many of these things are being done in Tibenham, and all by volunteers who deserve all of our thanks and appreciation. But there is always more that can be done. If you notice something that needs to be done, please let the Parish Council know by email, or by attending one of our meetings - details are on our website and elsewhere in this newsletter. You can ask the Parish Council for help in getting something done, or you can organise some volunteers to take part to help your community.

Vacancies for Parish Councillors

At the time of writing there are three vacancies for Parish Councillors. We are keen to remain as an independent Parish Council and not, as suggested by the District Council in the past, to become part of another Parish Council. The requirements of villages are quite unique and need to be dealt with locally.

We meet on the second Wednesday of every other month- January, March, May, July, September and November starting at 7.30pm. Members of the public are welcome to bring issues forward and see whether the Council can provide any help.

The War Memorial.

A complete remedial program of work on the Memorial in the Churchyard has now been completed, with cleaning of the stonework and replacement of the missing letters of the names by a professional company. This will keep the Memorial in good condition for many years.

The work has been organized and paid for by the Parish Council.

Village Sign

The Council is still keen to pursue the creation of a village sign, potentially to be set near the center of the village. Most villages have one already but Tibenham is yet to design and create one to provide some identity to the village. We are looking for ideas for a design for the sign; this could be based on the Tibenham logo designed years ago by the Tibenham Fundraising Team, featuring the silhouette of the Church Tower, the plane and the glider, as seen on the front of the Community Hall, or it could be something completely new - we welcome your suggestions.

The Boardwalk on Slough Lane

As many people may be aware a boardwalk was installed through a section of the Public Footpath 29 which comes out onto Pristow Green Lane, due to Slough Lane flooding on a regular basis, during the winter in particular. We are now working with the Ramblers to extend the board walk to cover muddy sections of the path at either end of the Boardwalk. The work will be done by volunteers working with supervision of a member of the Ramblers. Please watch out on social media and get in touch if you are able to assist in this.

Speeding Traffic

We have had a number of complaints about speeding traffic through the Village, the main one being Pristow Green Lane where the 30MPH sign is well within the trees. The PC is looking to have a village sign erected by Highways outside the tree line to make drivers more aware of the impending speed limit. All roads outside the 30mph limit are 60mph, the national limit, and some drivers do forget to slow down.

Flooding Issues

The new drainage system in the section of The Street from Hill Road to Church road has been completed and has worked well since completion. The Parish Council is now looking at the outlet from the village known as The Beck which runs down to a tributary of the River Tas through Cargate Common. We are investigating issues of pinch points which may affect water getting away from the village.

Just to remind you if a ditch or water course runs through your property, or forms part of the boundary, you as a riparian owner have a legal responsibility to maintain that ditch or watercourse even if you have inherited the problem from previous owners. We have witnessed people who have been doing work on the ditches, it is just a shame that one or two people do not maintain their own ditches which have contributed to the Highway flooding.

To remind you below is a full explanation of rights and responsibilities of riparian owners:

What are your rights as a riparian owner?

If your land boundary is next to a watercourse, it is assumed you own the land up to the centre of the watercourse, unless it is owned by someone else. If a watercourse runs alongside your garden wall or hedge you should check your property deeds to see if your wall or hedge marks the boundary. If the watercourse marks the boundary, it is assumed you own the land up to the centre of the watercourse. If you own land with a watercourse running through or underneath it, it is assumed you own the stretch of watercourse that runs through your land. Occasionally a watercourse, especially an artificial one, will be the responsibility of a third party. This should be noted in your deeds. Water should flow onto or under your land in its natural quantity and quality. This means that water should not be taken out of a watercourse if it could lead to a lack of water for those downstream. It also means that a person cannot carry out activities that could cause pollution to a watercourse. You have the right to protect your property from flooding, and your land from erosion. However, you must get your plans agreed by the relevant Risk Management Authority (RMA) before you start work.

Please remember these rights are affected by your duty to other riparian landowners, the community and the environment.

What are your responsibilities as a riparian owner?

You must let water flow through your land without any obstruction, pollution or diversion which affects the rights of others. Others also have the right to receive water in its natural quantity and quality. Riparian owners all have the same rights and responsibilities. You must accept flood flows through your land, even if these are caused by inadequate capacity downstream. A landowner has no duty in common law to improve the drainage capacity of a watercourse they own.

You should keep the banks clear of anything that could cause an obstruction and increase flood risk, either on your land or downstream if it is washed away. You are responsible for maintaining the bed and banks of the watercourse and the trees and shrubs growing on the banks. You should also clear any litter, debris or animal carcasses from the channel and banks, even if it did not originate from your land. You should always leave a development-free edge on the banks next to the watercourse. This allows easy access to the watercourse in case any maintenance or inspection is required.

Please help us protect water quality. Do not use riverbanks to dispose of garden or other waste where it could be washed into the river. This includes grass clippings, which pollute watercourses.

Your property may include a watercourse that runs through a culvert. You have the same responsibilities for the upkeep of a culvert as if it was an open watercourse.

What happens if I do not undertake my riparian responsibilities?

If you do not carry out your riparian responsibilities, we can request you to maintain the watercourse and you could face legal action under The Public Health Act 1936, The Land Drainage Acts 1991 and 1994, the Water Resources Act 1991 and the Environment Agency Land Drainage Bylaws 1981.

Tibenham Airfield

As many of you may know there have been a number of complaints about noise from cars at Tibenham Airfield. We were saddened recently to hear that there had been a fatal accident at one of the events, which took the life of one of the participants, and we pass on our condolences to the family and friends. As we understand the company involved have now stopped trading due to the accident and that results in fewer of the activities at the Airfield. The income from the motorsport activities do help the Gliding Club to maintain the airfield, and the other company will continue the programmes.

The Greyhound

Progress has been made in the rebuilding and refurbishment of The Greyhound and the preparation for the new road across the site. There have been a number of rumours about the site being sold, but recent contact with the owners has suggested that they hope to have the pub opened for Christmas and are not selling the site. There are still outstanding issues with Planning and Highways but hopefully these will be resolved soon.

Communications in Tibenham

Social media is well developed in the village and there are a number of channels that you can access to let you know what is going on in Tibenham and the surrounding area. The Parish Magazine – A printed magazine, $\pounds 5.00$ a year currently for a monthly edition posted through your letterbox that is circulated in Bunwell, Carlton Rode and Tibenham, originally and still a Church Magazine, but it is a very useful magazine with a wide variety of articles from organisations and individuals and advertising local businesses.

Pylons Response.

The Parish Council sent a detailed letter to the Secretary of State regarding issues and objections regarding the proposed Pylons to be erected by National Grid. It received the following response:

Thank you for your email of 4 October, to the Secretary of State, on energy infrastructure in East Anglia. The Secretary of State is grateful to you for having taken the time to write. I have been asked to respond on her behalf.

The Government expects annual electricity demand to increase from current levels by over 35% in 2035 and by over 70% in 2050. Offshore wind will play a key part in delivering this increase and supporting our transition to net zero. Without the development of necessary networks, both on and offshore, this ambition cannot be achieved, threatening energy security and increasing costs and carbon emissions.

The Government does not make planning applications or choose precise routes for energy transmission infrastructure but does set the rules for a robust and independent planning process. As such it is not the role of Government to undertake any assessment of alternatives to the locations chosen by the National Grid Electricity System Operator (ESO) or transmission operators and developers. Individual developers must demonstrate how their proposal meets nationally set criteria and has fairly considered alternatives.

As new infrastructure is proposed, developers must consider the impacts of offshore infrastructure in terms of its cost, environmental and marine user impact in the same manner as they consider onshore infrastructure. The lifetime cost for offshore cabling, as well as high maintenance costs, means that the presumption for new energy transmission infrastructure projects remains onshore. This cost is borne by electricity bill payers and must be considered when designing network infrastructure, as well as environmental and community impacts.

Where onshore transmission infrastructure is required, efforts continue to be made to reduce its impacts and ensure communities are treated fairly. For example, in sensitive areas such as an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONBs) and National Parks the presumption remains that any transmission cables which cannot avoid these areas is undergrounded. All projects are required to progress through the robust planning process which includes statutory consultations and proposals are independently reviewed. As ever, planning decisions can be challenged in court with sufficient grounds.

You will also be aware of the Offshore Coordination Support Scheme, a £100m grant scheme which was designed to support more developed offshore wind projects fund greater coordination. Through this scheme, the results of which will be announced this autumn, and our pathfinder project engagement in the East Anglia region we are actively supporting the development of new coordinated approaches to support industry in finding solutions to coordinated deployment in practice with the aim of reducing development impacts.

Given the role of the Secretary of State in determining Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project applications for development consent, the Department cannot comment on specific concerns regarding a proposed infrastructure project to avoid prejudicing any ultimate planning decision.

Improvements to the Hall Footpath

As you have probably seen, the new footpath and lighting has been completed and was officially opened on 7th September by Phyliss Hunt and Lyn Carey. A huge thank you goes to the Contractors, who worked through some very difficult conditions to produce what I hope you will agree is a fantastic new addition to the Hall's facilities. The lighting has made a massive improvement to the Car Park for those accessing the Hall on foot at night and also helps those using the Car park itself. The Committee would like to thank Mick Lilley who kindly made a private donation to the Hall to cover the cost of the lighting works.

Storage

The need for new storage facilities at the Hall is becoming an ever-increasing necessity. We have been trying to provide a wider range of events and activities, which has inevitably increased the amount of equipment etc that we need to store. As previously reported, we have been actively seeking to raise funds and have been looking at possible grants to allow us to progress with the storage extension. Unfortunately, the estimated Budget for the new extension is at present in region of £35-40K and realistically we felt that we needed to 'think outside the box' to find ways in which we could solve the storage issue sooner rather than later, but do it within our current resources. Grant funding for this type of project is very limited and it was unlikely that we would have been able to start the proposed extension for some considerable time. As you may have seen, we have started building a storage unit at the far end of the Hall which will enable us to store all the chairs, tables, table tennis table and some other small equipment behind doors. This will not only look much better than the existing arrangement but will hopefully be safer and easier for our users to access. As part of the construction works, we will be incorporating the sound and audio control equipment above the storage area, which will also enable us to free up space in the entrance Lobby, as this will remove the need for the Front of House Desk which is currently located there. It is also our intention to obtain a steel storage container, which will be located to the rear of the building, to enable storage of much of the equipment we currently have under the stage, and to allow for other miscellaneous 'bits and pieces' from the meeting room to be moved. We hope you will agree that this will make the facilities we have much more user friendly for everyone.

Digital Buddies

Our Drop in Coffee morning sessions have continued to thrive over the Summer and numbers regularly exceed 30 each week. One element of these sessions, with the

assistance of several dedicated volunteers, has been to offer help with our ever-increasing online world via our Digital Buddies group. It is becoming more and more of a necessity to have digital skills to gain access to NHS platforms to order prescriptions or to make appointments, and with many Banks closing their local branches, online banking is also becoming a necessity.

Many of our visitors do not have the necessary knowledge or skills to be able to access these platforms easily and are becoming very concerned about how they are going to be able keep up in this new digital world. We were lucky enough to receive a grant last year which was given specifically to support the well-being of our patrons and we felt that supporting this initiative would be an appropriate use of some of these funds. We have therefore recently purchased some new computer equipment to enable us to offer a digital 'hub' at the Hall where people can drop in and, with support from our volunteers, learn some new skills to enable them to gain confidence in this new digital world. If you feel that this is something you would benefit from, please do come along to our drop-in session on a Thursday morning from 10.30am to 12.30pm.
